

## Alabama Outdoor Classroom Program Aquatic Turtle Habitat Spring Maintenance Tips

Below are the supplies/tools needed to complete each maintenance task along with an estimated cost, an estimated amount of time needed to accomplish each task, and the frequency each task should be done.

WEEKLY SPRING MAINTENANCE TIPS  (once the turtles emerge from hibernation)						
Feed each turtle a balanced diet of fruit, vegetables and protein on its individual "feeding rock" so that they do not compete for food.	See Food List on AWF website	Food Cost if not donated	5-10 minutes	3-4 times per week		
Remove uneaten food from the "feeding rocks" and clean the rocks with dish soap and water. *Do NOT use any cleaning chemicals in the habitat.	Gloves, dish washing liquid, water, brush	\$5-10 per year	5-10 minutes	Once per week		
Check the perimeter of the habitat (including the boards or pavers) for possible new escape routes.	Boards/ pavers (if needed)	\$5-10 per year	5-10 minutes	Once per week		
Check your turtle's health. Contact a vet familiar with reptiles if you note changes in eating or behavior for more than 2 weeks, changes in color, softening or flaking of the shell, or discharge from the nose or mouth.	n/a	Cost of vet visit when needed	5-10 minutes	Once per week		
Check the pond pump and filter. Clean them out and check them for needed maintenance.	n/a	n/a	5-10 minutes	Once per week		
Check on the fish in the pond. If they have been eaten or died, add 5 or 6 more mosquito fish or goldfish to provide hunting opportunities for your turtles and so they will eat any mosquito eggs and larvae.	Mosquito fish or goldfish	\$0-5 for a few fish	5-10 minutes	Once every two weeks		
Water the plants in the habitat to a depth of 2 inches if it has not rained that week.	hose	n/a	5-10 minutes	Once per week		
Check the habitat for fire ants. If found, move the turtles to a terrarium. Use a broom to create holes in the fire ant mound, and put Diatomaceous Earth (a natural, non-toxic powder) into the holes. Do NOT use chemicals. It may take several applications. Do NOT return the turtles to the habitat until all fire ants are gone.	Diatomaceous Earth	\$20	5-10 minutes	Once per week

Hibernation - DO NOT DISTURB THE HABITAT	n/a	n/a	n/a	Until Late March or Mid-April

MARCH							
As the weather warms up outside, watch for the turtles to come out of hibernation. They may appear and then go back into hibernation for a few weeks if the temperatures fluctuate.	n/a	n/a	n/a	Twice per week			
Clean the pond by removing floating leaves and other debris, and then drain/pump out dirty water and replace with fresh clean water.	gloves	n/a	15-30 minutes	Once in the Spring

Divide and remove any plants that have become invasive in the pond and habitat. Do NOT cut the pond liner.	pots, soil, and small spade	n/a	1-2 hours	Once in the Spring
