

Swamp Rose-mallow

Hibiscus grandiflorus

Plant Description – Native, herbaceous, deciduous, perennial

Height: 5-15 ft **Width/Spread:** 2-4 ft





<u>Leaves</u>

Shape: Deltoid **Arrangement:** Alternate

Margin: Entire Form: Simple

Leaf Description: grayish-green and velvety (top and bottom of leaf are hairy); 3-5 shallow lobes; up to 10 inches long and wide; greenish-reddish hair stems

Flower/Bloom

Flower Color: White, pink red

Flower Shape: Funnelform In Bloom: Mar-Sep

Flower Description: Flowers have 5 overlapping pink petals that are reddish-purple at the base; flowers can be up to 10 inches wide and are one of the largest in North America; blooms open at night and last for one day





Fruits & Seeds

Spreads via: Seeds Seed Type: Fruit – Dry seed pod

Months in Seed: Summer - Fall

Fruit and Seed Description: fruit is dry, hairy capsule that releases rounded,

velvety, brown/ copper seeds

Ecological Benefits

Nectar source for hummingbirds, butterflies, bees, and other pollinators; seed source for birds

Maintenance Notes

Dormant in winter; flowers can be cut for indoor vase; dead stalks can be removed in winter; Remove old flowers before they form seedheads or prune plants back by 1/3 after a flush of bloom is finished to encourage rebloom; Keep mulch from touching the stems to prevent Southern stem blight; prefers moist to wet soil at all times (water three times per week)
