Eastern Red Columbine

Aquilegia canadensis

Plant Description – native, herb/wildflower, semi-evergreen, perennial

Height: 2 -3 ft Width/Spread: 1 – 1.5 ft



Leaves

Shape: obovate Margin: lobed

Arrangement: alternate Form: Compound

Leaf Description: green to blue-green; leaves at the base of the plant are petiolate (have a stalk) and are twice ternately (with leaftlets in three's) compound; leaflets are 3-lobed at the tips; leaves along the upper part of the stem do not have stalks (sessile) and are reduced in size



Flower/Bloom

Flower Color: red, yellow, pink

Flower Shape: campanulate (bell-shaped)

Flower(s) Description: drooping flowers 2 inches long with 5 upward spurred, tubular petals alternating with 5 small, colored, petal-like sepals and colored stamens hanging below the petals; petals are yellow and become redder at the tip of the spur

Food source for Butterflies, Native Bees, Other Pollinators, Hummingbirds, and Other Birds

Fruits & Seeds

Spreads via: Seeds & Rhizomes

Seed Type: Dry seed pod

Seed Season: Summer

Fruit and Seed Description: flowers are followed by 5 pod-shaped, tan follicles (dry seed pod) with long beaks that contain several, small, shiny black seeds

Maintenance Notes

Dormant in winter; does not bloom during first growing season; prefers average watering (water two times per week during the summer and once per week during the rest of the year)

In Bloom: Feb - July
