

Passionflower

Passiflora incarnata

Plant Description – native, vine, deciduous, perennial

Height: up to 25 ft Width/Spread: 3 – 6 ft





<u>Leaves</u>

Shape: palmate **Arrangement:** alternate

Margin: lobed Form: simple

Leaf Description: leaves are dark green above, whitish below, 3-lobed; climbs with axillary (between stem and leaf) tendrils (modified leaf structure used for support) or sprawls along the ground; base of leaf has 2 extra-floral nectaries (glands that secrete a sugary fluid) to attract ants

Flower/Bloom

Flower Color: pink, purple, blue In Bloom: Apr - Sep

Flower Shape: saucer-shaped, tubulate

Flower(s) Description: flowers are short-stalked and 2.5-3 inches in diameter; wavy or crimped hair-like crown sit atop 5 petals and 5 sepals, showy and erect pistil and stamen





Fruits & Seeds

Spreads via: Seeds & Rhizomes **Seed Type:** berry

Seed Season: Summer - Fall

Fruit and Seed Description: Large, leathery, orange-yellow berry; mature berry is brown; about the size of a large oval hen's egg; fruit contains many flattened, dark seeds, each covered with edible pulp

Ecological Benefits

Food source for Butterflies, Caterpillars (Gulf Fritillary, Variegated Fritillary, Zebra Longwing, Banded Hairstreak, Red-banded Hairstreak), Other Pollinators, and Other Birds

Maintenance Notes

Dormant in winter; prefers average watering (water two times per week during the summer and once per week during the rest of the year)
